A progress note is by no means the entire record of the visit. It is simply a snapshot of what transpired, including the most significant factual information. If the carer is already familiar with the client's routines and behaviour, the main point is to note any deviation from the client's normal routines and patterns.

They may also find they don't understand what's going on or why they feel they're not in control of what's happening around them or to them. All of this can affect their behaviour.

Changes in behaviour can be one of the most difficult aspects of living with dementia, both for the person with the condition and those around them. These behaviours usually happen when the person is feeling confused or distressed and trying to make sense of what is happening, or when they are trying to communicate that they need something.

Unfortunately, most types of dementia are irreversible and progressive. As dementia progresses, the damaged parts of the brain get more damaged. Other parts of the brain may also start getting damaged. So existing symptoms get worse, and more symptoms appear.

## **Stages of dementia | Dementia Care Notes**

Aged care providers' ability to meet their Duty of Care to clients is dependent on changes being recorded in the Progress Notes. It is also important to be aware that clients with dementia generally lose their ability to express, clearly, their needs and therefore carers and providers become their advocates.
